


SALAD SERVERS



Note: The drawings shown here are not to scale. Your chucks, your faceplates, and your wood, may all be slightly, or considerably, different in size.


For your first salad servers start with two blocks of wood 280mm long and 40 wide x 25 thick, or slightly larger if you wish. Mark the centre points on both ends.




Mount the wood between centres. You can turn this project between centres, or make a spigot on the blade end to hold it in a chuck with the tailstock brought up.




Turn the handle to about 20mm thick and your desired shape. Include a dripstop bead between the handle and blade. Sand and finish the handles. Part off the tailstock end then hand sand and finish that little bit



On the bandsaw cut the sides of the spoon and fork to shape. Leave these side pieces holding on by a tiny bit, or tape them back in place for the next cuts.



Mark the curve of the spoon or fork on one of the narrow sides. Use the other narrow side to ensure the work is secure and flat on the bandsaw while you cut to the curves.



Hand sand the spoon and fork ends to a good finish.
