The Pohutukawa

New Zealand's Christmas Tree



The Pohutukawa is a coastal evergreen tree of the myrtle family that produces a brilliant display of red flowers made up of a mass of stamens which flower from November to January with a peak in mid to late December



(New Zealand's Summer period), hence the nickname the New Zealand Christmas tree. It grows up to 20 metres in height with a spread of 38 metres and can be found in most North Island coastal cities and in the northern South Island.

Pohutukawa wood is a rich deep red-brown, heavy, strong and durable. It is extremely unusual to find a straight millable trunk, with most trees having multiple leaders spreading from close to ground level. The naturally curved shapes were used extensively by the early colonial sailors for ships' structural elbows and knees. The wood invariably has a tortuous grain, and is very dense and hard to work. Colour ranges from

soft pinks through to rich reds and tans with black streaks in older wood. Spalting (decay), bark inclusions and compression stress produce attractive grain patterns, and, while challenging to the turner, the wood produces a great finish. Many excellent exhibition and artistic pieces are made from Pohutukawa.

The inaugural pilot course for the Certificate in Woodturning was a great success. The rate of the course was steady and Terry



Meekan had assistance from Mac Duane and Dick Veitch, on the first day, which ensured the attendees had the right level of support at the beginning. Mac was kept busy sharpening the skews as all gained confidence with this chisel.

The balance of time between instruction and hands on was good. All participants undertook use of the range of woodturning chisels and equipment necessary for producing the four projects required of them. The first project was the honey dipper and Terry's instruction on spindle turning re-



sulted in all having success with their own. The next project was the goblet and again the use of the skew was further developed with the addition of learning how to sharpen. Participants also learnt and practised use of the spindle gouge, the use of a Jacob's chuck with a Forstner bit and tips on decoration. The next project was a bowl and this introduced the band-saw, methods of mounting, balancing the blank as well as the actual turning of a bowl.

The final project was the lidded box.



The weekend programme ran to time and there was an obvious improvement in skills. Many recognised what had caused their past failings and now know how to do it correctly. The need to be patient and have sharp chisels became apparent to all.

CATEGORIES

There shall be ONE class for all entries 26020 Bowls

Wooden items, which may be decorated with other materials, not exceeding 250mm in width at the extremities, which have been turned to a bowl shape on a lathe.

26021 Large Bowls

Wooden items, which may be decorated with other materials, exceeding 250mm in width at the extremities, which have been turned to a bowl shape on a lathe.

26022 Plain Bowls

Wooden items with no decoration, colouring, texturing or embellishment which have been turned to a bowl shape on a lathe. There is no size prescription.

26023 Plates/Platters

Wooden items, which may be decorated with other materials, which have been turned to a plate/platter shape on a lathe. The height must not exceed 20% of the diameter. eg: a 250mm diameter piece must not exceed 50mm in height.

26024 Hollow Forms / Vases

Hollow forms are wooden items, which may be decorated with other materials, which have been hollowed while turning on a lathe through a hole which is significantly smaller than the diameter of the finished work. Vases are wooden items, which may be decorated with other materials, which are at least twice as high as they are wide and have been hollowed while turning on a lathe through the main opening.

26025 Domestic Ware

Wooden items principally created on a lathe which may be decorated with other materials. This includes items such as rolling pins, spoons/scoops, egg cups, goblets, salt/pepper shakers, egg timers, amp stands, stools, and any other turned wooden items the turner believes to be utilitarian in a domestic situation.

26026 Lidded Boxes

Any wooden item turned on a lathe with a turned lid that fits into or over the body of the work.

26027 Ornamental

Any ornamental, sculptured or abstract item made of wood involving some use of the lathe in the making and Carved Turning being any item with more than 50% of the surface carved or textured.

26028 Woodcarving

Any item carved from a single piece of wood not exceeding 400mm x 400mm x 900mm.

26029 Pictures in Wood

Marquetry, intarsia, and scrollsaw work which creates a recognisable picture from one or many pieces of wood.

ALSO to be AWARDED

Supreme Exhibit in Show \$500

To be judged from all category winners

Best Overall Woodcrafter \$500

For most points over all categories.

Best Item by a First Time Entrant \$100

For the best entry by a person who has not previously entered items in this competition and has not won another prize in this competition.

Youth Award \$50

Dick Veitch - Vacuum Chuck




For many professionals, the vacuum chuck is an indispensable addition to their lathe's accessories, particularly for those engaged in bowl turning on a volume basis. For others, it offers a simple solution to the re-chucking of a partly completed bowl or platter for additional finishing work on its base. The "faceplate" can be shaped and padded to conform to a wide variety of bowl sizes and shapes and is quick and convenient to use. One method of setting up the connecting unit is detailed below.

A device using the suck of a vacuum pump to hold woodturning on the lathe for finishing cuts, polishing or other light work.

There are three main components: The vacuum pump, usually a vacuum cleaner; the connection to the lathe; and the faceplate.

The vacuum pump needs to be clean and in good working order. Some form of airflow control between the pump and the lathe is desirable.

The connection to the lathe may be on the outboard spindle or handwheel, or between the faceplate and headstock. The drawing below is for the outboard side.



CROSS SECTION OF VACUUM CONNECTION TO LATHE

The faceplate is a regular faceplate with a strong sheet of ply or mdf attached, cut round and dressed so that there is no wobble as it rotates. This surface does not need to be flat and may be shaped to fit a variety of work pieces. Foam rubber/plastic is glued to this outside surface.

This foam must be "closed cell" so that no air will pass through it. There are many types and thicknesses of closed cell foam. Choose one that is thin and robust.



Terry's Hot Tips Pro-Mount test

Peter Hewitt sent me a Pro-Mount Detailing Stand to try and when the Courier arrived he handed me an unmarked box about the size of a large brick and weighing the same. What a pleasant surprise to open the package and find that, no, Mac Duane hadn't been up to his old tricks





My first impression was the visible quality. I just couldn't wait to put all the bits together and see what this contraption was made for. However ALL that needed putting together was that the tool post supplied had to be screwed in. I should mention that the machining and finish made my new toy a thing of beauty indeed. Any toolaholic would love one of these just to



polish every day. In no time at all the system was in my tool rest and I started playing with holding different sized bowls and platters for carving. The work can be moved around 4-axis points. This was all new to me, as in the past I have placed work pieces on a large bean bag in order to work on them. As you would expect, this caused a few mishaps as the piece moved at unexpected times or the Dremel bit caught in the pillow slip and made for some exciting moments.

I have to admit I found a problem at this stage with the Pro-Mount. When a large platter was in a chuck I wasn't able to get at the handles to adjust them as they were restricted by the underside of the platter. However, Dick Veitch kindly





around on my trusty bean bag.



However it will be necessary to get the bench attachment that goes with the Pro-Mount, or a bench clamp. Being attached to the bench means the working height will be more accessible. Being attached to the tool rest on the lathe means it can be a bit high and working on a piece all day could become tiring. Too often I find myself bending over the lathe with the work still in a chuck so now I can work in comfort and know I am not going to have the work fall to the floor after hours of detailing.

The Pro-Mount didn't break with my 'rigorous' testing methods, even after falling from where it was sitting on top of my headstock to the floor. Another addition is an index system.



Congratulations, Peter! I feel you have created a winner which will be put to the test by woodturners and carvers alike, but it will still stand up to the test of time.

STOP PRESS! There's more! After using it and writing this brief I decided I needed to have all the extras that come with the Pro-Mount (being the toolaholic that I am). I now have the bench-mount kit and foot plate. This means I can now move



from using the Pro-Mount on the lathe to the bench mount, lowering the work height. Because of the tilt-angle axis points I can work with comfort from a bar stool rather than standing. My bar stool is a rotating type which helps my location to the work . You do lose one rotation axis on the table mount as the spindle can turn in the tool rest but is locked up on the shaft when in the bench mode. Peter assures me he is addressing this.

I made the discovery that, by setting up my Tanner out-board turning rig, I can work all around the piece being carved or textured. This would work equally well on the



all around the piece being carved or textured. This would work equally well on toutboard stand on a Teknatool lathe.

I now also have a hollow-drilled post so a vacuum pump can be used to hold work, which will be great for ornamental carvers or drilling on the drill press. A whole new set of possibilities arrived in my small brain as to the uses. All my face-plates that are set up for vacuum chucking can now be used on the Pro-Mount!

It also comes with a plate that is used by carvers for holding different pieces on the Pro-Mount. That enables the carver to have numerous base plates that can be changed at will so you can work on more than one piece at a time.

In conclusion, I recommend you *don't* buy one of these rigs as you will have so much fun playing with the possibilities that you won't get any substantial work done for a few days!

My next project is to make a nice box to fit all the bits in. What for I don't know, as it will most probably always be on the bench or in the tool rest.

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
Mini Lathes - FREE Loans


