
There were rewards aplenty and 67% of the artists from throughout the North Island went home with a prize. That is an amazing spread and should be a great attraction for future aspiring winners.

Graeme Priddle workshot









Graeme Priddle shared six hours with us - hours packed full of his philosophy, creativity concepts, technical skills, and practical advice and experience on a wide range of woodturning aspects. It took him eight years of full-time woodturning to develop his own original style. Now his creative ideas come from a "pocketful" of life-time experiences, sometimes in his dreams! "Give yourself permission to play" were his opening words. "Create narrative objects that tell a story".

His demonstration covered, in depth, such things as planning and design; selecting the right woods and learning awareness of their characteristics; tool sharpening and proper use; off-centre turning techniques; hand and power carving; surface decoration; making of decorative hot wire brands; using decoration brands in combination; collaborating with other-media artists to broaden your thinking; and many other practical ideas. His advice included encouragement to everyone to put their work out amongst their peers for constructive critiquing. "Don't be disappointed if you don't win a prize - nobody makes the perfect piece - have a go!"

With his demo piece, Graeme demonstrated the use of a Kel McNaughton Eccentric Faceplate, to good effect. His offcentre bowl was the product of much detailed planning - and trial and error. Attention to detail in design and workmanship

is "a given" in this type of work, but there were plenty of lessons for all levels of skills in his appreciative audience.

Another engrossing workshop from a master craftsman. Thank you, Graeme!

Ray Lanham's 'Do-it-yourself projects'

Make your own... Lathe ballast tool-box

Here's another crafty idea from Ray Lanham in Dallas, Texas, from his website Projects section. It essentially comprises a solid, lidded base section containing two heavy duty plastic trays for sandbags. Above it is fitted a versatile tool box with a hinge-up front for a professional finish. His original project over four pages is more detailed but these illustrations should convey the basic plan. See below for details of his website and more information.


























After loading the sandbags, the top of the ballast box (bottom of the tool box) was painted and screwed into position (see above). The toolbox was painted and screwed into position. The shelf was fitted and tool sleeves installed inside and out. Tools, calipers and other turning accessories were stored awaiting the first test drive.

President Jack and his members did another great job preparing the place. Pushing all the carefully stored "bound to be useful some day" bits that were in the shed off to one side and hanging plastic curtains to contain the woodies (or keep them out of the "treasures"). Then there was room enough for everybody. A couple of power boxes ensured a supply for 41 lathes, three scrollsaws, and the bandsaw.

The Competition and Instant Gallery tables needed watching as new items were added throughout the weekend. Some delightful work. The Competition prizes were sponsored by the National Association of Woodworkers, Turning Tools Ltd., and Treeworkx. Graeme McIntyre took the prize for Open Artistic with butterflies pierced and burnt into a rimu vessel. Ole JR showed he still has ability by taking the Traditional prize with an ash hollow form, with finial, stained and limed.

Graeme must also get the prize for heaviest lathe shift as he brought his Stubby – unmeasured kilograms of solid castings. Scamp's truck/double-deck motor home must have been the largest conveyance. Terry Scott's furniture trailer with three lathes was probably the best lathe supply, but someone may have had a greater number of small lathes. Turning Tools Limited would have eclipsed anyone for tool abundance and Treeworkx added their grand collection of tools, sandpaper and wood too. Outside the door Ross Vivian had fresh-cut miro, rimu, and other wood while Gordon Pritchard had a load of dry burl and treasures.

If I have forgotten to thank anybody, sorry, I was having too much fun to take good notes. I have already booked the second weekend of March 2010 to be there again.

Club night action

Wed 1 April *ORNAMENTAL TURNING*by Len Bacon

The machine that he wanted to show was a home-made rose engine. Six of these have been made by guild members. With this design the work piece swings from side to side whilst revolving on its main axis. The nature of the swing is determined by a rosette that is mounted on the drive shaft and bears against a fixed follower. The engine was designed to be hand cranked but Len has fitted a rotisserie motor to replace that operation. Also in the original design the work

piece movement was limited to a two dimensions. Len has modified this by inserting a 'swash plate' on the drive shaft. This plate acts in a similar fashion to the rosette but controls front to back movement thus enabling three dimensional movements.

The cutting is provided by a router type tool held in a cross slide. The type and position of cutting bit together with the rosette and the swash plate designs determine the pattern that will be cut on the work piece.

Len demonstrated a typical movement with and without the swash plate. He showed the results obtained from a particular rosette and some of his other rosette patterns. He then explained how he makes a square lidded box from a cube of timber. The steps are:-

Mount the cube on a scroll chuck in expansion mode.

Turn out the middle to the desired shape leaving enough thickness at the base to make a lid.

Move the cutter to the side of the piece and shape the outside.

Reverse the piece onto a face plate disc or jam chuck.

Turn outside of lid and form a knob sized to suit the compression jaws of the scroll chuck.

Turn off the lid, remove body of box and mount lid using the knob.

Turn out inside of lid.

He concluded with by showing a forming cut being made. Len brought various examples of OT work and explained what stage he has reached and where he intends to proceed next. We look forward to an update at a future meeting.

On the opening night for Term 2 - Wed 29 April, Terry offered us a very comprehensive exposition on how to make the designated Term Project - a lidded box. He had brought with him an impressive array of small boxes from his own lathe and also from masters like Richard Raffan, Guilio Marcolango and others to illustrate the finer points of design - shape, proportions, fitting of lids, embellishment and decorative extras, choice and combinations of wood and other materials, and character (masculine/feminine). He also had a set of stackable boxes that he makes - a set of matching boxes of diminishing sizes that fit snugly inside one another. A set of thirteen is his highest number to date. He is always on the lookout for interesting decorative bits and pieces that can be incorporated in the lids, such as the carved African head, above right, and embossed buttons, below.

Stability of the timber, as well as its character, is an important factor to ensure the

ease of fit of the lid over time, so while many items can be turned wet they need to be well dried before final turning. Illustrated are a number of the different stages in a project from the turning of a block of wood into a cylinder, separation of the lid, hollowing of the base and lid, and then the careful fitting of the lid, elegant shaping of the whole unit and finally the decora-

tive elements for the finished box.

NOTICE OF SPECIAL GENERAL MEETING

ORDER OF BUSINESS: Amendment to Constitution -

The Committee deems it desirable to register the Guild as a Charitable Organisation. This will have no direct impact on the day-to-day activities of the Guild but will improve several aspects of our financial management.

In order to satisfy the requirements of the Charities Commission in registering our Guild as a Charitable Organisation, we must satisfy the Commission that in the event of winding up of the Guild, any residual assets will be used for charitable purposes. An amendment to our Constitution is therefore required to include the words shown in bold print as indicated below. This meeting will be held as part of our Club Night on 22nd July. This change has been endorsed by the Committee and now requires approval at a Special General Meeting for which 2 months notice is given.

Notice of Motion: That the Constitution of The South Auckland Woodturners Guild Incorporated by amended as follows:-

Clause 14. DISSOLUTION

"If on dissolution of the Guild there is, after satisfaction of all debts and liabilities, any monies or properties of any description owned by the Guild, the same shall be disposed of for a charitable purpose or purposes, at the discretion of the members present at a Special General Meeting called for that purpose."

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


